Report of the Mission and Evangelism Division of the EBF (European Baptist Federation)



Rarely in life does such a conference seem so important? When we started planning a conference in June 2015, little did we know about the urgency of the subject by the time we met a year later. The conference *"Loving the Stranger: Live the Gospel, Share the Gospel, Be the Gospel"* took place in Elstal, Germany, from 31 May to 3 June 2016.

The start of the programme brought the urgency of the tasks to the fore. Throughout the previous 9 months, we had seen pictures on our TV screens from across Europe and beyond of refugees fleeing for security and a better life. What was also becoming clear at the time of our gathering was the beginning of the political fallout and the rise of hostilities from many countries towards the plight of those on the move.

We began by hearing the testimony of the German Baptists as to the issues faced across Germany and the way in which many of the Baptist Churches were responding. Early in our time together we visited some Baptist Church projects where churches were reaching out with good news to those in need and we also visited a refugee camp. Our keynote speaker was Juliet Kilpin from the UK who has been working within the 'Jungle', as it is known, at Calais.

The conference was attended by over 50 people from some 22 nations. Stories were heard from most of these nations, each with their unique perspectives, yet together they were common themes and issues.

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Many outcomes and lessons from the conference were agreed and these are listed below. It was noted that this conference would not have been able to take place without the support of many of the sponsors that enabled delegates to attend from some of the countries most affected, and so we extend our thanks to them.


As we listened, prayed and reflected together our conclusions were:

Blessing

While the media and politicians are describing the movement of people as a crisis, as the conference moved on we started to call it a Refugee Blessing. As we heard stories of what God was doing through these events and the way it was affecting churches and communities, and also the fact that the Gospel was being spread through the events, we could only describe it as a blessing.

Every refugee has a name

At a time when political leaders have described the refugees as a swarm, as if they were vermin, we noted that every person in the throng had a name and was known and loved by God. Many of the conference members talked of getting to know individuals and seeing the humanity behind the pictures. As we met, we were aware of many losing their lives trying to cross



Act quickly

As Christians and as churches we are not always light on our feet, yet we saw how the crisis was not an issue we can return to in 6 months but one that needs to be addressed now. As Baptists we are best placed to be able to respond, providing the needs, yet all too often we get stuck in our own structures that we miss the moment. Sometimes, like Jesus in Luke 8:45, we need to allow the needs before us to distract us, even when we are rushing towards our own missions or other aims.

Listen and respond appropriately

So often we respond with our easy answers and quick fixes and the danger of acting quickly is that we act wrongly. We need to listen deeply to the stories and testimonies of the refugee and respond to the needs appropriately. In doing this, we also allow them their dignity and enable human flourishing again. Whist we give the basic human needs of shelter, food and security, we also need to give time, a safe space and care. Too many refugees have become a "problem to be sorted" rather than a human to be welcomed.



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Crisis care and a new normal

Past historical events have often had relatively short crises before becoming a project of rebuilding. The conference felt that, looking at the future and the instability in many places, the responses we are making are likely to become the new normal. That is, for the foreseeable future there will continue to be considerable needs. Whilst the issue has largely disappeared from the media and has been replaced by the dangerous ISIS situation, refugees are still in need and God calls on us to respond.

See God

As we visited the refugee camp and talked with local churches showing love, we were struck how God appeared in so many places. The church was showing God's love, but so are many others, people of faith and no faith who are showing deep kindness and care to those in need. It is hard to enter a refugee camp without seeing the God-like attributes of those who want to make a difference for good. Jesus is in every refugee camp, not just through us.

Remember history

This is not the first time in European history that there has been such a movement of people. Whilst we learn the lessons of the past, we also need to see that this is a new movement, for new reasons. We celebrate those who risked their all in world wars to rescue people. We can learn from these people what it is to allow ourselves to become involved.

Rescue, Restoration, Integration

It is important to go beyond the basic to go deeper with people. Whilst it is vital to rescue people, it is for the long haul that we need to be involved. Churches are often good at the crisis but do not see it through. We need to find ways to help restoration and to find ways to integrate people into our communities as equals and partners in the gospel.

More Muslims coming to Christ today than in the whole of history

During the conference, story after story was told of refugees becoming believers. God is doing something amazing through this crisis. Some refugees have also returned home and begun churches in places where the gospel was not heard. God can do more than all we can imagine.

Some other outcomes that we identified to be worked on are that:

We need to create strategic prayer partnerships to pray for the work of the Baptists involved in refugee work. Grassroot networks need to be encouraged and empowered to get on with the job.

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Re-evangelisation of Europe has begun through this blessing. We need to get involved with what God is doing.

Storytelling, the story of what is really happening, needs to be told and not filtered through the media.

We need to humbly receive the gift that God is giving to us, and where required, allow it to change us and His church.

Whilst it is always easier to reshape someone into your image or ask them to become like us, the call of the gospel is going to a better place together.

After all this, and the struggle in three days to try to understand what is happening, and looking at how the church is responding, we were left asking what is our place in this movement? With all that is said above about the outcomes of the conference and our shared time together, we still have that ongoing question: What is God saying to us through all of this? We believe we all have so much more to learn and there is so much more to get involved in.

Dear friends,

As many of you are aware, I have been unwell during the last 18 months. As a consequence, I developed extensive infections of my knee and large areas of ulcerated skin involving my right leg, which failed to respond to several antibiotics. I suffered some days of confusion or complete lack of memory. Following three periods of hospitalisation during Easter and the middle of June to the end of July this year I was advised to undergo two operations, in order to deal with life-threatening, spreading septicaemia, the last involving amputation of much of my leg. Since then I have gradually recovered much of my earlier state of health, for which I thank God for His many blessings and love bestowed throughout this difficult time.

I wish to thank those who have upheld me by their prayers both singly and corporately in various meetings, through the spoken word, the written word and the many cards I received. I have been strongly aware of the loving support, encouragement and advice encompassed by the Church family at RBC., as well as by other friends and family. I would thank those spending their time during hospital visitations to me and also those freely offering lifts to take Sue home after long days of tiredness. I would particularly wish to thank the loving support shown by Sue: what a rich blessing God has provided to us from the time since we met and married! No man could want for greater love and happiness from his wife! However, her health has also caused me much concern, but we have prayed to the Lord that we might live for Him during whatever time remains to us.

What a wonderful God we have, who has blessed us in so many ways. May we all continue to trust in His Truths and Promises, following our Lord's commission - Mark 16 (AMP.). ¹⁵He said to them, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation".

My walk with God has been a whirlwind.

I was brought up in a loving and supportive family but there was no spiritual or religious influence. I grew up around families and people with similar backgrounds and had no friends that attended church or even believed in God. When I look back, I don't think I ever knew of anyone who had a real relationship with God.

I had a happy childhood but during my teenage years I got lost - those were my dad's words - he said, "Karen, we lost you".

During that time, I lived a destructive lifestyle and enjoyed living my life on the edge, pushing the boundaries in every area of my life, living in this bubble where I thought only of myself and my own needs. I had chaotic relationships, drifted from one job to another and used drink and drugs as a way of escaping the growing pain and inner turmoil that resulted from the choices I was making.

It was around the age of 16 -17 that I started to experience mental health problems. I didn't realise it at the time because I was so entrenched in this life of danger that I thought was exciting and cool. I went through what I can only describe as mental torture up until the age of 27. It was at this time that I believe God intervened and I had a breakdown and was sectioned. I believe it was a breakthrough - my mind was so broken that I had to reach rock bottom before I could begin to accept the painful truth that I needed help.

I look back and see that it was God's perfect timing, I just so happened to be working for a private medical insurance company at the time and so I received the very best care in a private facility.

I began a journey with many twists and turns - one step forward and 2 steps backwards. When I was 32, I had a daughter, Robyn, she's now 10.

Five years ago I met Angie, one of Robyn's friend's mum. She took me to an Alpha course. I was interested and liked asking her questions about God but it was not the right time for me and I didn't take it on board as a serious option for my way forward in life.

For those five years I tried many ways of healing my mind, I exhausted myself trying to find peace. Nothing worked. Despite gradually putting myself back together, that inner peace I was searching for eluded me. I found myself getting desperate to find a way of being happy and 'normal'.

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Then, over the Christmas holidays last year, I met up with Angie and the girls had a playdate at Kidspace. We sat and talked about God for 5 hours. I didn't realise it then but it was soon to be 'my epiphany'.

At the beginning of the year, I came to RBC. It was a very strange experience, I couldn't bring myself to sing and I sat there feeling so conspicuous that I had sweat dripping down my back. But for some reason I came back the following Sunday. From that week and for the next few weeks, I cried through the hymns, the prayers and most of the service. I just couldn't understand what was happening to me. Angle gave me a Bible. I didn't know what to do with it but after a few weeks, I started to read it. I began praying. This was a revelation to me. I used to say to Angie that I felt like I went into a trance when i was praying. She told me I was in God's presence. Well that blew my mind and I became addicted to this strange routine of getting up early before work and spending a while reading the Bible and praying!! It's now my favourite part of the day.

And then on Friday 10th April, I received the breakthrough and God opened the door that I had been knocking on this was unbeknown to me at the time but I now know that it was when I received the Holy Spirit. I went through a 3 week period of literally bouncing off the walls, feeling such love and joy for the whole world that I knew God had entered my life and I was His from that moment on. I know that God met me where I was at, and that he gave me what I needed to escape the world I had become entrenched in. He totally renewed my mind.

Since then, God has shown me so many things. I realise now looking back that everything I went through has been worth it. It will be used to help others who are suffering and I'm so looking forward to the day when God shows me how I can use the experience I've had for the good of other people.

God blessed me by giving me an amazing gift, my daughter, who is gentle, kind and caring, the exact opposite of what I was like - but he gave her to me anyway. I can't wait to see how her life will take shape now that we both know the Lord.

Words will never be able to express how thankful I am to God for what He has done in my life. He set me free. Every day since He came into my life He has taught me a new truth about myself and this world we live in. I want to spend the rest of my life fulfilling His purpose.


St FRANCIS

4th October is the feast day of St Francis of Assisi. When Francis came to God, people

thought he had gone mad and even his own father disowned him. But Francis' simple way of life soon attracted others. He and his companions went out to preach two by two. Unlike the preachers and priests that people were used to, they wore sackcloth and went barefoot. They were different in other ways too; they lived a very simple life and celebrated God's creation.

And to Francis all of God's creation was equally important. In one famous story a wolf had been eating people. The town wanted to kill the wolf but Francis talked the wolf into never killing again. And the townspeople made sure that the wolf always had plenty to eat.

Even blindness did not discourage Francis' spirit when he wrote his beautiful 'Canticle of the Sun' praising God through the miracle of His creation. Francis died aged only 45, worn out with years of poverty and wandering.






How do you make a paper fish swim? Cut a fish shape from a sheet of ordinary writing paper. Make it 10-12cm long,
