#### Not seeing what we have

Many of you will know that I recently spent a few days on Sommarøy, which is an island in northern Norway, way up beyond the Arctic Circle. I was there for the executive meetings of the European Baptist Federation in my role as the Chair of the Mission and Evangelism Commission.

We had 2 full days of meetings and, due to the full agendas, little time was given to enjoy the surroundings. I have to say that this was probably one of the most beautiful places I have ever been to, the scenery was spectacular. We did not see the Northern lights as we had 24 hours of daylight, although we did, though, see a lot of snow.

I got talking to the owner of the hotel we were staying in. This man had been born on the island and grew up there. He was a great man but he told us that he never realised that he had anything special. 400 people live on the cluster of islands and there is only one church, the Baptist Church.

When he started the hotel in 2001, he could not understand why people would cry when they saw the scenery or be in awe of the Northern lights, after all, he had seen it hundreds of times, since he was a small boy, it is normal isn't it?

He has since learnt that they had something very special, and he has seen his role as a hotel owner, to be a host that helps people to be transformed by the experience of seeing and experiencing the beauty of creation. His neighbours asked him, why do people who visit scream when they jump into the water, and he explains to them it is the letting out of the pressures of the offices that they spend their workday lives in.

Have you got something that you take for granted, something that others would love to have? Is this not a parable of the gospel itself? Could you share that which you have, that is life transforming, with others who are needing the freedom and life it brings?

# **Audrey Gwendoline Gostling**

5<sup>th</sup> March 1932 to 4<sup>th</sup> March 2017



I am sad to report the death of one of our members, Audrey Gostling, who went to be with her Lord on 4<sup>th</sup> March 2017.

Audrey was born in Cheltenham although the family moved to Romford in 1939. However, when war was declared Audrey stayed with her Auntie and Uncle on their farm in Somerset and went to the village school and the local Sunday School. She had some lovely friends there and it was here that she realised that our Heavenly Father was watching over her. She also learned to play the piano during this time and continued to use this gift throughout her life.

Audrey was baptised at Romford Baptist Church in February 1952 and joined the church, and became involved by playing the piano for the Girls Brigade, Sunday School, Women's Institute and at Parkside, where she played for the Monday morning services until shortly before her death.

Audrey had a wonderful sense of humour and she used to describe herself as an unclaimed treasure, although this changed when she met Geoffrey

at a badminton club at the YMCA. Geoffrey had already spotted her driving her white Ford Prefect in the area, which she named Lulu. They were married at RBC and celebrated their 51<sup>st</sup> wedding anniversary in October last year.

Audrey worked at the Bank of England for 21 years, where she oversaw a typing pool, but worked more locally before retiring.

Audrey was a wonderfully caring person, who was always busy helping others, attending the WI, Tuesday Fellowship and other groups. She helped at St Francis Hospice at one time, raising money with friends to support their work, and also collected money for Mission to Deep Sea Fishermen.

Audrey made a difference in the lives of many others that she encountered, and she always put others first and would alter her plans if asked to take a friend somewhere or to help them in any way. She told her son John never to let anyone know you are busy, since they will then not ask you for help.

Audrey was devoted to her husband Geoffrey and her son John, who she taught the right way to live his life, to help everyone and to keep the faith. She was very pleased to welcome Christelle into the family when she married John, and welcomed the French connection.

More recently Audrey took an interest in cricket and football, joining Geoff in supporting Spurs, and would get up in the early hours to watch the England cricket team when they were playing abroad.

Audrey had many friends, some like Daphne and Don May and Kath and Les Heard, for well over 70 years, but also cared deeply for people of all ages and made a difference in the lives of so many.

I am sure we will all remember her as a kind, generous and joyous Christian lady with an infectious laugh.

# **Obituary - In His Presence with Thanksgiving**

#### **Michael Laurence Eastman**

23<sup>rd</sup> October 1933 to 7<sup>th</sup> March 2017





I am sad to report the death of one of our members, Michael Eastman, who went to be with his Lord on 7<sup>th</sup> March 2017.

Michael has been part of Romford Baptist Church for many decades and touched the lives of many here and in the wider Christian world, so this tribute can only reflect a small part of such a busy life.

Michael was born in Woodford and the family moved to Romford around 1939. He was very close to his younger sister, Pat, and his encouragement had a major influence on her Christian walk and ministry.

Michael's Christian journey began when he was befriended at the Royal Liberty school by Richard Weir, who was a member of RBC, and it was through him and John East (Dave East's brother), that he was introduced to Christianity. He became a Christian at the age of thirteen or fourteen through attending a Crusader group. Michael was involved with Crusaders for some time after that and became part of the

church Youth Group and church.

Michael developed his interest in sport, and especially cricket, at the Royal Liberty school, as well as obtaining four A levels and being Head Boy. He then served in the Royal Artillery during his national service, where he attained the rank of 1<sup>st</sup> Lieutenant. Michael continued his studies and was awarded a BD (Bachelor of Divinity) by London University. Michael then became a teacher

for several years, and began working for Scripture Union in the late 1950s.

Michael was a fine cricketer who played for Essex Young Amateurs, Essex County 2nd Team. Gidea



Park Cricket Club, The Old Libertians and other teams. He was also a cricket coach and he coached youth teams until he was in his late 70s.

Michael and Sheila were married on 8th August 1959, and were blessed with two daughters, Claire and Rachel. Michael and Sheila worked together in Youth Work at RBC. I am one amongst many who will always be grateful for the way Michael and Sheila Eastman encouraged and supported generations of young people who grew into the leaders of their own day.

He became Secretary and Development Officer for Frontier Youth Trust in 1967 and worked in this field with disadvantaged or marginalised young people for more than thirty years, and made a clear positive impact on many

lives during this time as was made clear during the tributes given at the Thanksgiving service.

Michael also served many committees involved in Youth Affairs and Urban Affairs, including the YMCA National Board, National Council of Youth Services. Evangelical Alliance Urban Mission Forum. He also taught at various colleges including Spurgeons College, Elim Bible College, St. John's College, Nottingham, and London Institute for Contemporary Christianity.

Michael also had International Assignments in countries including Australia, Hong Kong, South Africa, and USA.

His work was also recognised by the award of the Queen's Silver Jubilee Medal in 1977 and the OBE in the Millennium New Year's Honours in 2000.

The service of Thanksgiving and Celebration for Michael's life was a wonderful tribute to a life lived fully for God. his family, and in caring especially for young people at the margins of society. A large number of people attended from his family and friends, his wide range of contacts in the local and wider Christian church, Frontier Youth Trust,

Scripture Union and other

Youth Work.

Michael was a truly inspirational man in so many ways, and in addition to his many national and international roles he was a great small group leader who passed on so much knowledge about the Bible and the Christian faith. He will be truly missed by us all as a clever, gentle, kind and modest man, who had a natural style and was a normal man who loved many sports.

Good morning church, my name is Lara and I have been coming to

Romford Baptist Church for just under a year now.

I grew up in the Church, but growing up in the church is not any kind of guarantee that your walk with God will be easy. I am sure my mum could share some stories about the "challenging" conversations she had with me about going to church.

I spent most of my youth and some of my adult life running from God, refusing to go to church, because for the most part I didn't understand why I was there. Refusing to serve and worship because it wasn't what my friends were doing; and frankly admitting that I went to church was sometimes embarrassing. I refused to accept Jesus back then, because I was scared of letting him down and sometimes I was even angry at Him because things in my life hadn't worked out the way that I had hoped or expected.

However, no matter how far I went

away from God, He was always with me. Even when I thought that I had disappointed Him and upset Him, to the point I thought that I couldn't hear from Him anymore, He was still there guiding my footsteps and bringing me back to Him.

My first Sunday worshipping at RBC just so happened to be a Baptismal service. I was so moved by the young people who were being baptised on that day and I was overcome with emotion. That day I meet Vikki, who prayed for me and she reminded me of just how much God loves me. I truly believe that, that Sunday I was led to RBC by God.

I have tried so many times to commit to baptism, but for one reason or another it never seemed to happen for me. At the very last minute I'd get so frightened that I'd back out and I would tell myself and those around me that it just wasn't my time. I realise now that it was Satan keeping me from the will of God and chasing me away from this act of obedience.

I realise now how much God loves me and that He doesn't require me to be

# Inspirations card Making

We had a really enjoyable trip out to Crafty Arts in May, when Sarah inspired us with a zig zag card and a dress card, but the next workshop is back at RBC on 8th July from 9.30am - 12.30pm. This will take the form of a Masterclass in Embossing and Glynis will be back

with me to help.

If you're not sure what embossing is, think back to your childhood when you used to take bark rubbings. This is the same principle but defi-

nitely with less effort! A piece of card is placed in a folder which has an impression moulded into it. The folder is then passed through a die cutting machine and the pattern on the folder makes an impression on the card. The card can then be incorporated into a card design, or you can use it with punches to add interest to punched shapes.

There is just the one workshop on this occasion as this is a Masterclass, but there will be a variety of embossing folders for you to try. If you have a die cutting machine and embossing folders, please bring them along, but if you haven't or you are unable to bring

yours, please do not worry.

Everyone is welcome! Even if you are not a regular card maker or you haven't got a die-cutting machine – still come along and make some samples which you can use to make cards and tags in the future.

The £5 fee includes materials and re-

freshments including homemade cakes!

# **Mary Jones's Bible**



When a number of us from RBC did the Unlock London walk, one of the

churches we visited was Holy Trinity, Clapham. This church was the Bible Society checkpoint for the walk, and it was interesting to read of their connections to William Wilberforce who was instrumental in campaigning for and founding the **Bible Society**. Their displays also told of the faith and determination of Mary Jones who wanted a Bible she could read and understand in her own language. Having read her story when I was a child, I decided to look up more about Mary and her link with the Bible Society.

In 1800 a 15-year-old Welsh girl named Mary Jones heard that, for the first time in her life, the Bible was available in her own language. Determined to possess a Bible of her own, Mary saved money over six long years and trekked 26 long miles through the rugged terrain of north Wales to buy a copy. With the help of Revd Thomas Charles of Bala, who arranged lodgings for Mary and sold her three Bibles for the price of one, Mary Jones' determination was rewarded. Her story - and her unswerving desire to get hold of God's written word - soon became the talk of the churches in the area. (ref: https:// www.biblesociety.org.uk/about-us/ourhistory/)

Barbara Gatherum recently gave me a note mentioning the Mary Jones World, which celebrates this story. You can now visit Mary Jones World I Llanycil, Wales. According to their website, Mary **Iones World** is a state of the art visitor and education centre that tells the story of Mary Jones and Thomas Charles, and the impact of the world's bestselling book - on Wales and the world. You can step back in time, follow Mary's journey, and explore what happened next through multi-media and interactive displays, exhibits and activities in their redeveloped Grade 2-listed building. Set on the edge of Lake Bala, with a picnic area, facilities and children's playground, Mary Jones World offers a great time out for children and adults alike

If you're feeling particularly energetic, you can walk in the footsteps of Mary Jones. There is a guide on the website which will lead you on a 28 mile linear walk through spectacular countryside from Llanfihangel-y-Pennant to Bala.





# St RICHARD of CHICESTER

St Richard of Chichester, who lived from 1197 to 1253, is patron saint of the English county of Sussex.

In 1244 Richard was elected Bishop of Chichester but King Henry III wanted someone else as bishop and he ordered that no one should feed or house Richard. So Richard lived with a friend who was a parish priest and visited his entire diocese on foot for two years until the king relented.

Richard is widely remembered today for the prayer he is supposed to have said as he was dying. The prayer was adapted for the song 'Day by Day' in the musical Godspell and it is in this form that most people know it today:

> Day by day, Dear Lord, of thee three things I pray: To see thee more clearly. Love thee more dearly. Follow thee more nearly. Day by Day.




