Eulogy for Doris Norman - 21/09/2023



Doris was born in April 1939, just a few months before the outbreak of WW2. The family lived in the East End of London at the time and

it wasn't long before the family were evacuated away for their safety. The first part of the war Doris was evacuated with her Mum. older sister Iris and brothers Arthur and Alf. Although unsettling, the family were together, apart from their father, who remained in London as he had a reserved occupation. However later in the war Doris İris and Alf were evacuated to another place without their mother or older brother. Some of this time was ok but one particular home where they were housed was not a happy one and this experience was to forge a strong bond between them which lasted the rest of their lives together.

Doris was always a very central part of our family. She spent all of her Christmases with us and I have many happy memories of time spent with her. One memory that comes to mind is when we would play a game called beat the black ball. Doris would get so excited and scream when her ball was almost caught by the black ball. Doris was a very positive and happy person; I rarely saw her down apart from when her very close friend Liam died 9 years ago. She always had a smile and was quite laid back and didn't let anything faze her.

Doris was a passionate animal lover and supported many animal charities, especially those supporting animal welfare and rescue centres. She herself adopted many cats from rescue centres and in recent years these were older cats that no-one else wanted. The last of which. Mitzie, is now finishing her final years living with my Mum. Doris trained in shorthand and copy typing and we recently found her school certificate which showed she got 98% in her exams. No surprise then that Doris worked her whole life until retirement as a copy typist in central London.

In her twenties and thirties Doris was a keen Tennis player and this probably explained her love of the Wimbledon tournament. Each June everything went on hold as she avidly watched the matches.

Doris also loved cooking and we had many a chat about new recipes I had tried and she would copy the recipe to

Doris also gave blood regularly up until retirement and clocked up 40 years of donating!

Not many people knew that in her younger years Doris also played the accordion and I understand she did a lot of crochet when I was young and I received several beautiful dresses she had crocheted for me.

In recent years, particularly since my husband Neil retired, we have enjoyed many great holidays together with Doris and Mum, a couple of times a year. This year in May we went to Suffolk and visited some of their favourite places like Southwold, Felixstowe, Aldeburgh, Dedham and Flatford Mill. We had fabulous weather and this will be one of the good memories we can hold of Doris. We also spent valuable time with family members, loanne and David who live near Colchester, and also on a day trip, spent time with Mike and Sue in Broadstairs. Doris loved the sea and would always jump at the chance of spending time at any seaside resort. She loved visiting my friends' beach hut at Walton, where we celebrated several birthdays.

I have talked a lot about the things Doris loved and what was important to her but far and above all of the previous things I mentioned was Doris' faith in Christ.

She first heard about lesus at a London City Mission children's week in Stratford. There she made a commitment to God and when the mission closed down she moved to a church in Canning Town which she attended with friends. A change of home prompted a move to Highway church in East Ham, where she was later baptised. Another change of home brought her to this church and she became a member in 2003. When searching for papers required by the solicitor, we came across a piece of paper with the following verse written out on it by Doris.

Psalm 61v1

"When my heart is overwhelmed, lead me to the rock that is higher than I." Underneath she had written the following; When we know Jesus as our saviour, repented of our sins and asked him into our lives, then this life is not the end but just the beginning of a new life with HIM. None of us know what this life holds for us, but what we can know is that Jesus makes all the difference.

Today we say a final farewell to our Dorie but if we know Christ, we know that we will meet her again in heaven one day. I thank God for her life and for all that she has meant to all the family over the years.
