Pastor's Page

Shame:

A simple 5-letter word, from the letters of which you can make 44 other words. Often used as someone looks at something that has gone wrong, and says quietly, "Isn't it a shame!"

Yet it is a word that is destructive, devastating and also used as Sin is bad enough, but weapon. shame! Don't bring shame upon yourself or your family! Many have suffered personal devastation from the power of shame upon their lives, the embarrassment and their reputation is in tatters! In some countries people have even been killed for the shame they have brought on their families.

I have become convinced that, while the power of shame is destructive, the Bible and Christmas has something very different to say. God, who you would have thought would want to preserve His reputation, allowed cultural shame to surround the most important event since the creation of the world, the birth of His son, Jesus, the hope of the world. He suffered the shame of being born out of wedlock, being homeless, a refugee, fleeing for a continued existence.

The boy became a man and again suffered shame, the shame of the cross, the shame of being whipped in public, the shame of a ruined reputation in the public space. Paul, writing to the Corinthian church in 2 Corinthians 5:21 says, "God made him who had no sin to be sin for us." So when you feel shame, Jesus does understand and does not reject you.

Paul completed the verse with the following: "so that in him we might become the righteousness of God." What does that mean? It simply means an end to our shame, God has made it possible that our shame can be turned into righteousness.

So as we enter Advent, the message of Hope comes real again, so don't imagine that God does not understand your feeling of shame. He understands what you did feel but He also invites you to let go of your shame and experience the righteousness that He longs for you to have. This is why He suffered shame.

We spend too long wondering about our reputation. In God, we have an opportunity to have a new beginning, without shame, so take it, after all it would be a shame not to.

Obituary - In His Presence with Thanksgiving Maureen Stewart

10th April 1945 to 19th September 2016





I am sad to report the death of one of our members, Maureen Stewart who went to be with her Lord on 19th September 2016.

Maureen was brought up in a Christian family who at-

tended Salem Baptist Church, where her Dad was a deacon and elder. Maureen moved to Main Road Baptist Church (RBC) as a young person due to the attraction of their thriving youth group. She had believed in God from an early age, and was baptised as a believer at RBC at the age of twentyone.

Maureen's Mum, Daisy, lived with John and Maureen for many years following the death of her father in his fifties, and had a very positive influence on the lives of both John and his children. John came to faith a bit later in life and this was in no small measure due to the dedicated faith of both Maureen and her Mum.

Maureen was involved in RBC for a long time and in various ways and was involved in running the crèche for many years.

She also ran the Fishers café with Liz Harvey for a number of years, which served coffee, tea, cakes and light lunches as an outreach to the local community and friends and associates of RBC members.

Maureen and John were a wonderful team and served God and His church in a loving and consistent way for many years. They were kind and caring and always there to help anyone needing help or encouragement and did this without making any fuss or drawing attention to themselves. Maureen supported John faithfully as he served on the diaconate and as a Parkside trustee, and her strong faith shone through her life in so many ways.

Maureen was a wonderful cake baker and some of her recipes were amazing and enjoyed tremendously by so many of us at RBC over many years.

Maureen was also a keen gardener and vegetable grower and a connoisseur of unusual varieties of tomatoes. Her interest was shared with a number of us who have benefitted by receiving tomato seedlings, which produced different colours and shapes of tomato.



Maureen was a wonderful example of faith triumphing over adversity as she fought cancer and with John she continued to attend church as often as she possibly could during her arduous treatment.

The service of thanksgiving for Maureen's life was a wonderful tribute to a life lived fully for God and gave glory to her saviour. Her fortitude in adversity and suffering was a real example and challenge to us all and was reflected in one of the hymns chosen for the service:

"When peace like a river attendeth my way, when sorrows like sea billows roll; whatever my lot, thou has taught me to say; 'It is well, it is well with my soul"

Maureen will be sadly missed by John, Sarah, Matthew and her grandchildren and by her many friends at RBC and beyond. However, she will be fondly remembered for her love, kindness, caring heart and for her exceedingly good cakes!

The Romans had invaded Israel and still ruled it. Zechariah and Elizabeth were an old childless couple living in the hill country.














So far we have been able to use food in our Special Needs Small Group (Fruit and Bakery), the Kerygma group on



Mondays, (bakery products, vegetables

and fruit), Alpha meals (vegetables, eggs, bakery, and fruit) and Church Breakfasts (eggs, fruit, bakery) to name but a few!

The fruit, vegetables and bakery and tinned food we have received is all good quality and well in date, and leaves us able to put back finances into



other areas.

In return, we help Tesco to reduce its food waste (as highlighted on TV

by Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall).

At the time of writing, I am doing all of the collections on Monday and Thursday evenings, which is a big commitment, but I am passionate that good quality food, which I would happily use at home with my own family, is not sent to landfill just because there is no system to get it to those who can use it.

I would, however, be very glad to hear from anyone who would be willing to help with this scheme. You need to be able to drive and have a reasonable size car, as there can be up to 6 large boxes of food
