"Insecure leaders are like fireworks with a lit fuse. It's only a matter of time until they explode, and when they do, they hurt everyone close to them." John Maxwell

This is not just true when talking about leaders, it is true of all people. People who are insecure are likely to explode and when they do, they will hurt people around them.

So where do we find security to ensure that we are not the one who is likely to explode and find ourselves hurting others and then sensing disappointment in ourselves.

Firstly, our security is not in possessions, our achievements or our ability to always be right. Our security is found in a relationship with God.

My soul finds rest in God alone; my salvation comes from Him. He alone is my rock and my salvation; He is my fortress, I will never be shaken. Psalm 62:1-2,

Secondly it comes from being at peace with ourselves. So much of the way we are and the way we behave is tied up with the image and understanding we have of ourselves. We need to learn to make peace with ourselves. As Christians we are forgiven, renewed people.

Jesus talked about someone who comes to faith as being a new creation, or born again (John 3:16). Although the new body may at times be getting old and worn, in Christ we can be renewed daily. Paul, writing to the Corinthian church, says "Therefore we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day." Cor 4:16

Reflections



As I approached 80, I began to reflect on the way God had been there at every turn - the God incidences. When things don't seem to be going as I hoped

or wanted, it has always been good to look back and praise God for being there all the time.

This was confirmed last Sunday morning as I read Psalm 20 and the challenge was to write a Psalm of praise for His love towards me.

As a child of about 5, I went to a Sunday School in a neighbour's front room and learned CSSM choruses (CSSM is Children's Special Service Mission). In 1953 I went to a Scripture Union 'camp' in a boarding school (with 3 school friends) and was challenged to give my life to Christ – but I didn't tell anyone! The faithfulness of a dormitory leader keeping in touch took me to Haringey to hear Billy Graham in 1954 and I went forward – I was 15.

I joined the Congregational church my parents attended, helped at the morning Junior Church and attended the evening service. I was also a member of the Schools Christian Association, meeting in the Henry Martin Hall in Cambridge five times a term after evening church.

We had no Christian help from teachers in school but the school secretary invited us to her home for regular Bible Studies. I felt God calling me to be a Christian teacher (despite the negative reaction of the headmistress).

In 1957, as the result of poor exam results, I did not go to my first choice of college. I knew no one and had never been inside the college. The very first person I met was Pat Eastman, Michael's sister, who was looking out for me, as a Christian had sent my name in to the C.U.

In 1960 I met up with a Christian school friend and discovered that we were both set to join the same school in Northampton for our first year of teaching. It was not a happy school. I moved on to join college friends teaching at Abbs Cross. It was an opportunity to help with the C.U. in school, young people's weekends away and after school, inter-school training of local secondary pupil C.U. leaders, teachers' prayer groups, etc.

Before I came to RBC I had been challenged through scripture about baptism. Never having been to a baptismal service, I was baptized in March 1963

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by Godfrey Robinson and joined RBC. For many years I was involved on Sunday mornings at Harold Hill Baptist Church but worshipped at RBC on Sunday evenings and the Wednesday prayer meeting. In my 'long' summer holidays I continued with our annual S.U. summer camp, my final 15 years as the caterer. In 1975 I told them it would be my final year – why? I didn't know, but God did. My father died in August 1976!

In 1968 Sheila Eastman encouraged me and found me a flat. "Ok it will be fine for 2 years", I said to God. 50 years later and I am still here.

In 1981 Mum was able to move from Cambridge to the flat next door. She always wanted what would be easiest for me!

In 1992, after two lots of major surgery and starting to care for Mum, I left teaching expecting to work at Parkside or Hospice. I ended up caring for Mum for the best part of 7 years. I was so apprehensive about being alone when she died. Anne Barnes popped in one evening, suggested Gordon drove round and collected Winnie. She decided to stay the night, and Mum died that night. How good is God?

Small group and prayer meeting are a vital part of my life. I have always been involved with schools work and am a trustee of Graceworks.

I thank God for being there each step of the way although there have been many ups and downs, and pray I will continue to trust Him for the future.

Obituary - In His Presence with Thanksgiving

Brenda Beaver

4th July 1934 - 23rd July 2018



I am sad to report the death of one of our members, Brenda Beaver, who went to be with her Lord on 23rd July 2018.

Brenda was born on 4 July 1934 to parents Florrie and John Byford, and she had five brothers and three sisters. Her dad was a builder/bricklayer and her mum cared for the family. She attended Love Lane Infant and Junior School and passed her 11+ exam and went to Southend High School for Girls. She was in the Girl Guides at Rayleigh Baptist and always helped out if there was a need somewhere.

Brenda was taken by her sisters to Sunday School at a very early age at Rayleigh Baptist Church, where she later became a Sunday School teacher herself in the Primary Section which she loved. She used to take her large handbag with her and if any child became distressed she would allow them to go through her bag and they soon forgot about being upset.

After leaving school, she worked on the counter at Rayleigh Post Office, where she really enjoyed serving others and the social aspect of meeting so many people who she knew. Brenda met Dickie when his family moved to Rayleigh and came to the church, and it wasn't very long before the romance began and they were married at the church on 12th October, 1963. They were blessed with a son and when Mark was still very young, they moved to Romford.

They started attending Romford Baptist and Brenda became well involved in a number of aspects of church life. Brenda loved to visit people, and especially those in need, and she also headed up the flower team at church each week. The team had great fun working together to produce a wide variety of beautiful displays, especially those for Harvest, Easter, Christmas, weddings, funerals and other occasions over the years. Brenda was also a member of the Floral Art Society and the Fine Arts Society.

Brenda also used her skills with flowers as a basis for hosting garden parties at their home for the church's 50th Anniversary, St. Francis Hospice, BMS World Mission and the Bible Society. Cakes, other refreshments and a good social time were also part of these events, while money was being raised

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at the same time for good causes.

Brenda was skilled in making people feel welcome and valued as a person and this led to many long-term friendships. She was so interested in each one as the person she was talking to that everyone really felt that they mattered.

In addition to all these attributes Brenda had a practical caring heart, and offered hearty Sunday lunches to family, friends and those in need. She was a fantastic cook and her lemon drizzle cake was legendary. Their home was open to family and friends alike, whether for Christmas celebrations or as people popped in and out over the years, particularly latterly to spend time with Dickie. She was also a lover of jigsaw puzzles and there was invariably one out in the lounge for all those who visited to join in with, including the carers as they came day by day for Dickie.

Brenda was unable to be as involved in RBC as she would have liked for a number of years since she devoted herself to caring for Dickie. However, she remained a valued friend to many people and continued to take an active interest in the church and its people.

Brenda will be sadly missed by her family and her many friends of long

standing.

Obituary - In His Presence with Thanksgiving

Eunice Dalrymple

21st April 1927 – 5th September 2018





I am sad to report the death of one of our members, Eunice Dalrymple, who went to be with her Lord on 5th September 2018.

Eunice was born on 21st April 1927, the youngest daughter of parents William and Ethel Weeks and sister to Beryl. She often reminisced, in great detail, incidents from her childhood and teenage years which gave the sense of a truly happy and loving family.

When she was 21, she met and fell in love with Ken Dalrymple and they married on 30th September 1950, and their only son, Andrew, was born four years later.

Eunice was a hairdresser by trade and she continued her career after Andrew was born by becoming a 1950s version of a mobile hairdresser, by visiting elderly or housebound ladies in their homes. Eunice always had a positive, enthusiastic fun view of life and her cup was always never half empty, but half full. Indeed, it was full and overflowing and this was reflected in her hospitality, openness and welcoming nature to all. For many years Eunice and Ken regularly provided hospitality in their home to visitors, friends and acquaintances from their church. Eunice was a great baker and she was always on the lookout for a new recipe that she could try out and then share with others.

Eunice and Ken resigned their jobs in their early fifties and became volunteers who travelled extensively together in the UK, Europe and Africa as Mission Aid workers. They carried out a long and valued ministry during this time.



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Ken died in 2007, so Eunice looked for a new focus for her energies and at the age of 80 enthusiastically worked as a volunteer in the Parent and Toddler group at RBC.

In recent years, the frailty of old age, together with mental health issues, led to increasing dependency on her neighbours, friends and family for her daily living needs. Eventually she could not live independently and for the last three years was wonderfully cared for by the staff at the Merrie Loots Farm residential home.

Eunice remained positive during these difficult times and retained an indomitable optimism about life.

Eunice will be sadly missed by her son Andrew, daughter-in-law Jenny, her grandchildren and great grandchildren and her friends at church.
