Obituary - In His Presence with Thanksgiving

James William Hooper 18th April 1934 - 14th January 2019



I am sad to report the death of one of our members, James Hooper (Jim) who went to be with his Lord on 14th January 2019.

Jim was widely known, over many decades, to RBC mem-

bers and friends as "Uncle Jim", and this pays tribute to the affection with which he was held by so many people during this long period of time. Jim was so much part of the fellowship, and together with Iris, his wife of more than sixty years, he was such an example of how to live life as a disciple of Jesus Christ.

Jim was born in Tottenham and had two younger sisters. During World War Two they were evacuated to several locations, therefore attending several different schools, before settling in Walthamstow where he completed his schooling.

From 1943 Jim attended Cubs, Sunday



School and Youth Club at St Luke's church, where he joined the choir and he remained at the church until 1957.

Jim left school aged sixteen with several passes in the Cambridge School certificate, and began his working life at a firm of chartered accountants in Cheapside, London, which set his career path for the rest of his working life.

Jim was called up for National Service in the RAF when he was 18, had several UK postings and progressed to Senior Aircraftsman in the Equipment Accounts department. After finishing his term of service, Jim decided to pursue a career in Accountancy and began working for a firm of Accountants in Piccadilly.

Jim travelled to work each day on the Central and Piccadilly lines and his path regularly crossed with Iris as she travelled to Tottenham Court Road, and they were engaged at Christmas 1956 and married in October 1957. They had two children, Gillian, who was born a year or so later and John a few years later.

Jim qualified as a Chartered Account-

ant in August 1960 and this helped develop his career in accountancy at various companies and also led to his involvement as Honorary Treasurer at RBC from



1974 to 1995, as well as treasurer at St.



Francis Hospice and the Essex Baptist Association for several years.

Jim and Iris

moved to a house in Stanley Avenue in 1961, sharing with Iris's parents for a number of years, and Iris and Jim remained there until 2004, when they moved to a smaller property. We were privileged to have Iris and Jim as nextdoor neighbours for ten years and cannot speak highly enough of their friendship and Christian love and concern for us and the other neighbours. Jim and Iris were also keen gardeners, so we shared produce, plants and gardening tips!

Jim was a man of many interests and talents, including philately, listening to classical music and singing. He was a member of the church choir in decades past and also sang in the London Emmanuel Choir for a number of years. He and Iris also served for some years on the Patient Participation Group at the Medical Centre in Brentwood Road, where they were much loved by the staff.

Jim experienced some health issues in recent years, but continued to serve the Lord and His church, showing great resilience and perseverance. More serious health problems emerged in 2017 and Jim chose to trust God for the path forward and not have aggressive treatment, and was exemplary in his faith and trust in God as his health slowly deteriorated. Iris was a tremendous support for him during this time, as were their children and grandchildren and many friends at church and beyond. The prayers and support of these many people resulted in freedom from physical pain during his last months and Jim displayed an immense trust in God and was totally at peace with his situation.

The thanksgiving service for Jim's life was a wonderful tribute to a life well lived for both his family, his Lord and Saviour and the people he met every day.

Jim will be missed by Iris, his whole family, his many friends at church and in the community and beyond, but we are comforted to know that he is now at rest with His Lord in heaven.

36th UNLOCK LONDON WALK Saturday 27th April 2019 walking around the Merton, Morden and Wimbledon areas of London.

The area has its own interesting history; there's an abbey/priory, some important political, royal, and railway history too.

You'll see trams, trains and buses a-plenty, and as well as pounding urban pavements you will cross a National Trust Park, and elsewhere skirt a common. Twice you'll find yourself walking beside water, though it's often hidden behind greenery. And there's a City Farm to visit if you have time.

In addition to a special Place of Interest there are seven checkpoint churches reflecting a variety of traditions and with some exciting approaches to ministry in the community. These include such enterprises as regular Christian Theatre, provision of laundry and shower facilities, and offering catering training to local college students.

<u>1 April - Fooling Around</u>

I was about six when I began to enjoy April Fool's Day. My older brother was very clever at appropriate hoaxes, not only deceiving me but also mum and dad. On the whole my childish efforts were encouraged. The day was full of laughs, even at school, where the teachers would try to trick us and all day long no one quite believed anything they were told. So it went on, year after year, though I think it all seems as a bit unsophisticated for the modern generation.

You couldn't say that, though, about probably the most famous April Fool's effort of all time. In the 1960's BBC TV broadcast a feature on the spaghetti farms of Italy. Even those of us who bought our spaghetti in the supermarket from the pasta shelves began to wonder if we'd been wrong. Italian farmers explained their work and the progress of the spaghetti plants was carefully filmed, from planting to reaping. And all in the BBC's most serious documentary manner. It took a while to appreciate that this was Aunty playing games. Whatever next!

The odd thing is that no one is quite sure of the origin of this very British tradition. Most attribute it to changes in Britain's calendar in the 1700s, when New Year's Day moved from March 25th to January 1st. Not surprisingly, the change caused a lot of confusion and mistakes around the start of April. Others look further back, to the ancient Roman feast of Hilaria, when the goddess Cybele was celebrated with pranks and jokes around the spring equinox, March 25th. Either way a touch of hilarity at the end of Lent does not seem amiss. Go to Greece, where the resurrection of Jesus is celebrated with fireworks and parties to see how it might work.
