


The Adventure of Serving

As many have reported during their membership interviews, my family and I felt led by God to attend RBC in January 2008. At the time, we considered it a "New Year's resolution," which has now turned out to be what I would call "God-intended orchestration"! After a while, especially seeing our children settled in, we transferred our membership and have been blessed to be members of RBC ever since.

It has been a genuine honour to have had the opportunity to serve at RBC as a deacon. Alongside Neil, Bernd, Hayley, and John Stannard, I was welcomed into the diaconate during the Annual General Meeting held in April 2016 (the first appointment) and was re-elected to serve an additional term a few years later. For those of you who are mathematicians, you may be quick to identify the obvious question: did she serve more than eight years? The answer is affirmative, thanks to transitioning from one charitable incorporated organisation (CIO) to another. Our very first leadership meeting paved the way for us to realise that leadership in the church is far different from any other space. The first agenda contained 19 items for discussion, accompanied by several papers! It was clear to us that there was much to be done, and God was entrusting us to do His work in His way. Our meetings are known to be long; we are a mixture of many skilled people, but importantly, the best skill we share is the love for Christ, His people, and His appointment. So, I am quick to state that RBC is indeed blessed with servant-hearted folks who are fully committed to doing their very best for Christ.

My area of responsibility is membership, and in this role, I have had the most enjoyable opportunities to inter-

view people and sometimes visit them at their homes (mostly pre-COVID). In recent years, we have engaged individuals at their convenience, i.e., after service or during



the day at a coffee place (the former more than the latter). All in all, during my time as the membership deacon, we have welcomed 92 friends into membership: a mixture of 11 associates and 81 full members. My thanks go out to everyone who has participated in interviewing these individuals. I have also had the wonderful opportunity to work alongside the ministers during baptisms – which are such joyous occasions - and during the newcomers' welcome events. Serving in these areas has essentially granted me the chance to meet new friends and be a part of their Christian journeys, which has also helped me grow.

Becoming a deacon can feel like a significant journey filled with much to learn! I reflect on the challenges I set for myself from the very start, particularly my commitment to always act in ways that align with God's principles and genuinely connect with names

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and faces. The beauty of it all is that with dedication, anything one puts their heart into can be achieved through Christ. While I can't say I excel every single time in remembering names and faces, I genuinely strive to make that my goal and that effort has brought a lot of blessings into my life.

Reflecting on the changes since 2008, I join those who have been here before me to express how truly grateful we are for how much RBC has grown; we've experienced not only an increase in numbers but also an incredible growth in spirit as we've opened our arms to many incredible individuals who have joined us since—a truly remarkable blessing from God to grant us the grace to carry such a responsibility.

Aside from being a deacon, I cherish serving as a small group leader and at the welcome desk, where I engage with people and help answer queries related to various needs. I'm thankful to everyone who has enriched my journey in this area. I'm a 'hug' person and it brings me so much joy to receive warm hugs from those I meet. At RBC, we are a beautiful family, rich in our dynamic



diversity, which makes us uniquely special and brings us closer together,

strengthening our faith in Christ. Love is our foundation, and I feel so blessed to have found a treasured place like RBC and to be able to call it my home. This week, we started the new small group series "Radical Roots," in which



While watching their story, it dawned on me that we are all empowered to do something for Christ (whether small or big, in the forefront or in the back office), and collectively, our individual efforts can create a story told to generations to come. Greetings, a news update from the bookstall.


There are number of books available on sale to buy.




The Whole Life for Christ by Antony Billington & Mark Greene. It focuses on how to devote time understanding God's plans and applying it in your everyday life.

A Clearer View

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Last September, I had the privilege and blessing of being able to purchase a new (although second-hand) car. I love my blue VW Taigo. Every time I get in I thank God for this blessing in my life. Like many car owners, I know the benefit of good maintenance. My dad always taught me to wash my car regularly. Aside from making me smile because it looks nice, it does actually protect the paintwork too, of course.

I was driving along a winding, leafy, sun-dappled lane in Hullbridge near Southend recently, enjoying the beautiful weather and scenic landscape. The spring leaves were just starting to burst forth in their vibrant new colours. The road was very twisty, often turning 90° to face another direction. My windscreen was clear and vision was great; it was an enjoyable journey.

Then, just as I took one of these corner turns, my windscreen suddenly looked iust terrible, full of smears and streaks. The sun was right ahead of me, emphasizing every little mark. Where had my clear windscreen gone? The position I faced made a huge difference in my perspective of the messy patches on my windscreen. With the sun behind me, my windscreen looked as if it had just been cleaned, but with the sun in front, every flaw was revealed, inside and out.


As I continued my twisty journey, frequently changing direction, the smears and marks appeared and disappeared as I drove along. Once again, God showed me a valuable lesson in an everyday situation.

When I am not looking at the light of



my life ticks along in its usual routine. It's only when I take time to meet with the Lord, face His direction and spend time reading His Word that He reveals things to me which need addressing. I don't like being told about my faults (who does?!). However, over the years of my Christian journey, I have come to realise that it's good practice to ask God to reveal areas of my behaviour which need addressing. Although sometimes painful, I've also learnt that God does this for my own good. I know now from experience that things are better afterwards. It can be a difficult prayer for me to pray – "Dear God, please reveal to me the area which needs work and change". I generally live what people would consider a 'good' life – I work hard, care for my family, serve in the church. I don't commit crime, and help where I can. This can sometimes be a barrier between me and God, though, as I sometimes think I don't really need helping. A dangerous game. Pride can stand in the way of my growth in Jesus. I always find it helpful to reign in these thoughts and realign myself with God's standards, rather than thinking I'm a good enough person in the world's eyes.

Bradwell Pilgrimage on **Saturday 5th July**



I attach the latest poster about the Bradwell Pilgrimage on Saturday 5th July, in North East Essex, which might be of interest. It's been going for over 70 years, and my husband and I have been the last 3 years and found it a very special time, and I'm now involved with the planning!

The day starts at 10.30am with a service at St Thomas' Church* in Bradwell (car park at the village hall), then a 1.9 mile gentle walk to St Peter's Chapel and adjacent grounds, where there will be another service, worship, workshops, and this year there will be children's activities and various stalls. Elaine Storkey is the Keynote speaker. Adam Atkinson, Bishop of Bradwell, will be hosting the day.

It's a day when you may be refreshed and be sent back out, to be a light to the world.

The Chapel of St Peter's-on-the-Wall was almost certainly originally built by Bishop Cedd in 654. Cedd travelled south from Lindisfarne to spread Christianity. Many people travel from afar to St Peter's, which is often described as a holy place to come and meet with God. The life of the Chapel centres around the annual Pilgrimage. In recent years, in the week running up to the Pilgrimage, local schools go for a day for their own 'pilgrimage', and there is a record number attending this year!


Sunday evening services are also held in the Chapel in July and August (details still being confirmed).
